RESEARCH NEWS

Ureaplasma and Mycoplasma are emerging bacterial pathogens associated with disease. There is evidence that they are associated with non-specific genitourinary infection, premature birth and neonatal pneumonitis. Currently there is no standard test available to diagnose these infections. This study will evaluate whether MYCO WELL D-ONE assay can reliably provide improved clinical provision for the detection of Ureaplasma and Mycoplasma in clinical samples and demonstrate their antimicrobial susceptibility.

Well done to our team at the Department of Sexual Health for recruiting 456 patients in the MYCO WELL D-ONE study!

Getting down to the science... The collection of samples is only the first step towards this study. Samples are processed and research conducted on them in the laboratory at the Division of Infection and Immunity, University Hospital of Wales. It takes several weeks and lots of hard work for experiments to be conducted on each sample. Everyday is spent in the laboratory carrying out research on the bacteria, including on the weekends! Dan Morris is a crucial member of the study team, as the MPhil student for the MYCO WELL D-ONE study. The research will form part of his MPhil at Cardiff University, School of Medicine, supervised by Dr Brad Spiller and Professor Tim Walsh.

We are currently involved in a research project which is called MYCO WELL D-ONE which involves using left over urine samples for research purposes. Hopefully, when all the information has been gathered and analysed more research can be done. I think it has been an excellent project and I have contributed to it. The only downside was at the beginning of the study, research nurses had to get used to the way clinic runs. When we had the same research nurses every week, it easier for staff and runs smoothly.'

Providing patient care and innovation



As the research study has progressed, the research protocol has become more like second nature in the team and is streamlined into clinics. The whole team of health professionals is resourceful and committed to delivering the best patient care and providing opportunities for developing new tests for our patients in the future. Our 5 research nurses Lisa Roche, Kelly Thomas, Heidi Clarke, Lisa Mellish and Joanna Wilson have been instrumental in moving forwards with this study.

Participating in research studies is not for everyone. However, here is some positive feedback from our patients who consented to be part of the research study.

A patients perspective?

When patients were asked about their experience of being part of a research study it gave interesting results which may surprise:

83% of patients agreed or strongly agreed that they would be happy to take part in another research study

89% of patients agreed or strongly agreed that they had a good experience of taking part n a research study

95% of the patients thought that research staff were approachable and professional

80% of patients strongly agreed that taking part in research should be part of normal NHS healthcare

85% Of patients took part in research to help others

Results are from the Patient Research Experience Survey (PRES) that was conducted during 2016/2017 in the North East and North Cumbria.
